The venue of day 1 is a modern **international conference centre on Germany's highest mountain, the Zugspitze**. It can be directly reached by a comfortable cogwheel train (see www.zugspitze.de for details). The conference centre offers spectacular views of the Bavarian and Austrian World of mountains. It's a five-minute walk to the Igloo Village and mountain chapel. A cable car takes you to the Zugspitze summit at almost 3.000 m in just a couple of minutes. ESCI includes an evening networking reception in the Zugspitze summit lounge.

Complimentary shuttle bus service will be offered to and from hotels in Garmisch-Partenkirchen and Eibsee station, where the cogwheel train to Zugspitze leaves and returns.

The venue of day 2 is the **congress centre ("Kongresshaus") of the City of Garmisch-Partenkirchen**, the former Olympic city on the foot of the Zugspitze. It can easily be reached in a walk or by public transport. The Garmisch-Partenkirchen region is by the way home of several academic institutions concerned with security studies, such as NATO School.
